THE MIRACLES OF THE SAINTS

On page 398 is to be found the following: "The divine power of the church was furthermore established in the eyes of the people by the wonderful works which Christian (Roman Catholic) saints were constantly performing. They healed the sick, made the blind to see, and the lame to walk."

Do Not Accept Teachings

Protestant Americans do not accept these miracles of the saints of the Medieval Roman Catholic church and do not wish them taught in our school books. On the contrary those Protestants who have given the matter careful study agree that the art of Christian healing as taught and practiced by Christ Jesus and his apostles and as was common during the first three centuries following began to wane after the adoption of Christianity as the state religion.

Protestant Americans do not regard Pope Gregory VII as a "humble little servant of God," nor his life and teachings as having anything whatever to do with the simple and sublime teachings of Christ Jesus, as taught in the Holy Bible, nor do they intend that the books of our great American public schools shall be henceforth used as a means through which Roman Catholic ideals shall be held up before the minds of American children, and the superstitious and degrading fear of the potency and power of the curses which Roman church is implanted into the consciousness of those young people who are being reared under the STARS AND STRIPES.

Real Americans

Real Americans, those who are loyal to the constitution, and the American flag, those who are earnestly striving to maintain those ideals which have descended to this great nation from the Pilgrim forefathers, see in this teaching of Roman Catholicism in our public schools, a great menace gnawing at the very heart of our national life, and threatening to defeat the very object for which these institutions were established.

The Argument may be advanced

that the taxpayers of Indiana at the present time, the farmer, the property owners, the business men of the state, are heavily weighed down and that the change of school books will involve heavy loss and further expense. This argument, however true, will not hold long with those men and women who, at any sacrifice, are determined to stand true to their country, their children, and their God.
