

The statement was made by Rev. Dr. Joseph G. H. Barry, rector of the Church of St. Mary the Virgin

ion, Father Barry said: "This is what it appears to me we can accept as the basis of reunion: First, the primacy of St. Peter and of the bishops of Rome by jure divino; second, a jurisdiction in all cases allocated to the bishop of Rome by jure ecclesiastic: third, an infallibility which is the mind of the church through the pope, as its organ of statement, and which is authenticated by its recognition by the whole church.

"To approach the question with Rome we must abandon the anti-Roman attitude," he said. "But we can not do all the repenting. because others have something to repent. We must wait until Rome ceases to treat us as rebelllous subjects."


